#### Heartland Honor Flight Dick (Jonny) Johnson

Shipmates and Friends,
My wife and I went to an informational
meeting for finances at a senior housing
center near our home in Lee's Summit,
MO, about a year and a half ago. While
there, some of the Veterans were
encouraging Vets to sign up for the
Heartland Honor Flight. They had been
to Washington, D.C. on one of these
flights. Well about a year after signing
up, I called as to the status of where I
was on the list of Veterans going. I was
told that the World War II Vets were to be
the first served, but I would be put on
standby.

I was then instructed that I would need to go to an informational meeting explaining what and how this flight takes place. It took place about 2 weeks before the flight. It was very informative. At this meeting there were many World War II Vets in attendance. Each Veteran had someone (guardian) to help and see about their welfare during this long day's journey.

I was called to replace a World War II Marine who had fallen and broke his hip. This was 3 days before the trip. I was excited to go and see these Monuments and meet other Vets.

We arrived at Kansas City International

Airport at 5:00 a.m. on Oct. 6<sup>th</sup>. After some training as to what was going to happen, we left about 6:30 a.m. on a chartered flight to Ronald Reagan Airport in D.C. There were about 200 people on the flight – 90 Veterans and the rest were guardians and staff and helpers. There were many wheelchairs available for those in need.

We landed after the 2 – hour flight and disembarked to a band playing 50's music. So much excitement from the small group of well wishers who greeted us. We boarded 1 of 3 buses and with a police escort started on our tour. During the day we made friends with all the fellows and girls on our bus. There were several WW II women Vets in attendance. As we went to each monument, we got on the buses and traveled to the next monument. This helped to keep the walking down to a minimum. In between times we were fed delicious box lunches and snacks.

We visited the World War II, Korean, Vietnam, and Air Force Memorials. At the Monument to the Raising of the Flag on Mt. Suribachi on Iwo Jima, I met a Marine who was at the raising of the flag and got to shake his hand. He was in a wheelchair, but was very sharp. We saw the changing of the guard at Arlington Cemetery. It was quite a memory to be there in person.

When we returned to the Ronald Reagan Airport, a band greeted us with music and ladies who wanted us to dance with them. It's neat to see 80 - 90 year olds jitterbugging and kicking up their heels.

Was a fun way to end the day!

On the way home, we had Mail Call. We each received well wishes from family, friends, and school children. The teachers in some schools had given an assignment to students to write to these Vets who had given much to their country in their younger years. Some were so neat and well thought out. This Winter I will answer some of them.

We received food all day long in Box Lunches from Arby's. It was the best trip that I ever made, but tiring. We did not get back to KC until 10:00 p.m.

When we entered the halls of Terminal C on our return, we were met with the largest crowd of well wishers imaginable. Bagpipers, Music, the Flags, Military Personnel, Guardsmen, Police, Families, Children with Signs, Balloons, Smiles, Hugs and Joy. There were probably over a 1,000 people waiting to greet us. In talking to some of the well wishers, they all had a story of their pride in someone in their family who had served in the military. Proud to be Americans!!!

It was a great, but tiring day for older folks. I wouldn't have missed it for the world!

Memories from Paul Lebowitz by Jerry Lebowitz

Paul Lebowitz joined the US Navy at age 17 in February 1944 before graduating high school (he later went back to get his high school diploma). He attended boot camp in Farragut, Idaho. After boot camp, he was assigned to the Navy base at Treasure Island, California on San Francisco Bay. Paul was then sent to Bremerton, Washington. He was present when the USS Gregory was commissioned. The initial voyage of the USS Gregory was to San Diego on a shakedown cruise. From San Diego, the USS Gregory went to Saipan and Tinian in the Northern Mariana Islands, where the fleet was assembled for the invasion of Iwo Jima. The USS Gregory supported the invasion of Iwo Jima by transporting Marines. The USS Gregory knocked out tanks and trucks on the island. While leaving Iwo Jima (near Chi Chi Jima), three air force pilots were rescued from a rubber raft by the USS Gregory crew. While rescuing the pilots, the USS Gregory was shot at but was not hit due to a smoke screen. The ship then zig zagged at top speed out of the area.

The USS Gregory then went on to Okinawa. On picket patrol between Okinawa and Formosa (now Taiwan), the USS Gregory encountered Kamikaze pilots every day. After three days, a plane exploded next to the USS Gregory making the ship "dead in the water". The ship was then towed to an anchorage for repairs and went back to a San Diego destroyer base. While getting additional repairs in San Diego, the US dropped the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki thus ending World War II.

After his stay in San Diego, Paul was transferred to a small patrol craft at the Navy's Camp Shoemaker (near San Francisco). He was honorably discharged at the Chicago Naval base in March 1946 at age 19.

Paul's main responsibility on the USS Gregory was being a signal man. This task included being a sight seatter on a 5 inch 38 gun.


